This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

At Nantwich Primary Academy, we use the Kapow music scheme across the school.

As a school, we deliver our music curriculum through the Kapow scheme of work which builds progressively from EYFS into key stage 1 and then key stage 2. Our scheme fulfils the statutory requirements of the National Curriculum (2014).

The intention is to help children to feel that they are musical and to develop a lifelong love of music. The spiral curriculum adopted by Kapow and the structure of each lesson incorporating elements of listening, performance and composition, ensures that key skills are regularly revisited and built upon.

Kapow provides a participatory and inclusive approach to music learning. All children are actively involved in using and developing their singing voices, using body percussion, learning to play tuned and untuned instruments and learn music-specific

vocabulary in a meaningful context. Observations have shown all pupils, including SEND, engaged and active during the lessons and using the language of music to discuss it.

Informed by the Model Music Curriculum (2021), in addition to their weekly class-based music lesson, the pupils at Nantwich Primary have opportunities to learn musical instruments and engage in further music experiences.

Part B: Music Tuition

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

At Nantwich Primary, we offer many opportunities for the children to develop their musical skills outside of their weekly music lessons. Pupils across school receive a program of vocal and instrumental ensemble from specialist teachers working in the Love Music Trust:

Pupils in Reception class receive a term of singing which ends with their involvement in a Rex the Dinosaur concert that is held in Congleton Town Hall.

Year 1 receive a term of glockenspiel teaching and perform to their families.

Year 2 receive a term of vocal ensemble and perform the 'Barnaby Bear' concert with other local schools at Congleton Town Hall.

Year 3 receive a term of violin lessons and hold a concert in school for their families.

Year 4 participate in Singfest which enables them to practice alongside other schools and ends with a performance at Congleton Town Hall.

Year 5 receive weekly brass tuition for the duration of the year which culminates in a performance with the Halle in Manchester.

Part C: Musical Experiences and Events

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

In addition to the concerts and musical experiences outlined above which show that the overall provision is diverse and values all musical styles, genres and traditions, our children across all key stages have a further range of opportunities to engage in musical events.

Each year, the whole school attends an in-school theatre performance. Pupils in key stage 1 have the opportunity to join the school choir and all pupils participate weekly in a whole-school singing assembly. Throughout the year, all children have the opportunity to perform to parents and the local community by taking part in Harvest Festivals, Remembrance Worship and Christmas productions. In addition, year groups provide their own individual musical experiences such as singing for the elderly in the care Homes and singing within class.

In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

We intend to continually develop the quality of music education by embedding an ambitious, cohesive and well-planned curriculum which meets the needs of all pupils, that is promoted consistently by all staff and ensures that Music is being assessed in a purposeful manner throughout the year groups.

Continue to develop and implement a programme of wider opportunities across school with a focus on singing, instrumental tuition and performance.

Build musical links with the local community with a focus on the children experiencing live performances covering a broad range of genres. Eg. Classical pop.

Track attainment in Music that is informed by video evidence and pupil voice matched to national curriculum aims.

Establish regular music assemblies to promote singing together alongside developing pupil's knowledge of popular culture.
